

2025 HIGHLIGHTS

INTERNATIONAL CRICKET RETURNS

International Cricket returned to the Northern Territory for the first time in 17 years. The 2025-26 Australian Summer of Cricket officially began in August in Darwin with Australia taking on South Africa in two Men's T20 Internationals. Close to 18,000 people packed out TIO Stadium for what were the first T20Is ever played in the Top End.





WEATHERALD ASHES SQUAD SELECTION

The 2024-25 Sheffield Shield leading run scorer was rewarded for an incredible 18-24 months of performances with selection in the Test Squad for the 1st Ashes Test in Perth. Born and bred in Darwin, the left-hand opener will, if selected in the final XI, become the first ever Northern Territorian to play Test Cricket and wear the famous Baggy Green Cap.

RECORD-BREAKING TOP END T20 SERIES

The 2025 Top End T20 Series sponsored by Tourism NT achieved a global audience of 53.4m viewers (up from 12.8m in 2024) with the event quickly developing into Australia's leading domestic T20 competition outside the BBL. The fourth edition featured 11 teams including 5 BBL Franchises and International Teams from Pakistan, Bangladesh, Nepal and the US.

FIRST NATIONS INVESTMENT

The Northern Territory Government delivered on its election commitment to support Indigenous cricket growth with funding of \$2.0M over four years to drive increased participation, engagement and representation, and inspire a new generation of Indigenous boys and girls across the Northern Territory to love and play the game.

Chrissie Ponter (Federal Cricket Club, Alice Springs) and Mel Nixon (Tracy Village Cricket Club, Darwin) became just the second and third Territorians to win Cricket Australia National Community Cricket Awards when they won the 2025 Volunteer of the Year and Women & Girls Initiative respectively.



AUSTRALIA 'A' LOOK TO DARWIN

First-Class Cricket returned to Darwin for the first time since 2006 with Cricket Australia choosing the Top End to host a series between Australia 'A' and Sri Lanka 'A'. Local boy Jake Weatherald made his Australia 'A' debut and scored a big century (183 off 275) in the second four-day match at DXC Arena to continue to push his claims for a Test debut.

FIRST NT U16 FEMALE TEAM

Thanks to 'Play Our Way Program' funding female participation in the NT continued to surge and for the first time ever the NT entered an U16 Female Team in the Cricket Australia Underage National Championships aimed at nurturing young female cricketers and helping them progress through the pathway.



MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

It is my privilege to present my first report as Chair of NT Cricket, reflecting on a period that has been nothing short of historic for cricket in the Northern Territory.

I would like to thank the mums and dads, family and friends that continue to show up and support our players week in week out. From the car-poolers to the boundary markers, to the umpires, the scorers or the ones that turn up to watch, this is what grassroots cricket is all about and you are the foundation of our game and for that I would like to thank you.

In August we proudly hosted the first-ever Men's T20 Internationals in the Territory, with Australia and South Africa launching the national summer of cricket here in Darwin. The first game sold out, and the quality of the TIO Stadium pitches received the ICC's highest rating. These games not only delivered world-class cricket but also highlighted our rich and diverse culture, making clear the Territory's ability to host major international events that bring broad ranging economic and social benefits.

The success of these matches was only possible thanks to the collective efforts of our staff. On behalf of the Board and as a cricket lover of the Northern Territory, I extend our gratitude to every member of the NT Cricket team. Your professionalism, passion, and dedication ensured these games will be remembered for decades to come.

- Our Events Team for their commitment, energy, and generosity of time in delivering memorable experiences for fans
- Grounds and Facilities Team for producing pitches and outfields that drew praise from players, officials, Cricket Australia, and broadcasters.

- Our Community Cricket and Pathways Team for their work with players, officials, volunteers, and the broader community to provide a truly world-class experience.
- CEO Gavin Dovey and the leadership team of Nick Winter, Jake Pavlich, and Karl Mayne for their vision and tireless efforts in elevating NT Cricket's brand and reputation.

You have all demonstrated what is possible when teamwork, passion, and professionalism come together.

The 2025 Top End T20 Series was the most successful to date, establishing itself as the leading domestic T20 competition outside the BBL. With 11 teams, five BBL Franchises, International Teams from Pakistan, Bangladesh, Nepal, and a U.S. based franchise, the competition reached more than 50 million total unique viewers worldwide.

Feedback from players, coaches, and officials has been outstanding, and this event now firmly positions Darwin and the Top End as Australia's "Winter Cricket" Capital.

The tournament also provided invaluable opportunities for our NT Strike Squad. It was inspiring to see senior Territory players return to wear the NT colours alongside our next generation of talent. The performances of emerging players such as Tom Menzies, Charlie Smith, Cadell McMahon, Sam Barker, and Archie McCormack highlight the bright future ahead for Territory cricket.

We are also very grateful to Airport Development Group (ADG) for their ongoing major support of the 2025 Top End T20 Series. Their hospitality hosting visiting teams, match officials and event staff at Darwin Airport Resorts has been instrumental in our ability to continue delivering elite-level experiences. The partnership with ADG also embeds important tourism, economic and infrastructure benefits for the Territory.

The NT Government's recent commitment of \$2 million over four years to develop Indigenous cricket participation is a landmark investment. It will underpin many of the programs we are delivering in regional and remote communities. Our commitment to inclusion continues to deepen. We are proud that over 200 young Indigenous girls have participated in remote community programs such as Woolworths Cricket Blast which continue to help expand our reach in remote areas.

The Multicultural Cup and Remote Carnivals remain central to our mission of ensuring cricket is welcoming, inclusive, and accessible across the Territory. These events strengthen community connections and provide pathways for participation and excellence.

We would like to thank all our commercial partners, particularly our long standing major partner DXC Technology, whose wonderful support remains vital to sustaining the growth of our game.

The achievements of the past year are a testament to the collective efforts of our CEO Gavin Dovey, NT Cricket staff, volunteers, players, officials, partners, parents and vast array of supporters. On behalf of the Board, thank you for helping us set a new benchmark for cricket in the Northern Territory.

Together, we have demonstrated that the Northern Territory is capable of delivering events and programs of genuine international standard, while continuing to nurture grassroots cricket and inspire the next generation. With this momentum, I am confident that the future of cricket in the Territory has never looked brighter.

Finally, I extend my thanks to Cricket Australia and the Northern Territory Government for their support in launching the international summer of cricket here in Darwin. Proudly recognised as Australia's home of "Winter Cricket."





MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

The 2024-25 season will be remembered as one of the most successful in the history of Northern Territory Cricket, defined by the return of International Cricket for the first time in 17 years, a now global T20 winter competition and record levels of investment in our community and grassroots programs.

In what was an incredible season for Northern Territory Cricket, I am pleased to share my third Chief Executive's Report.

Over the past two years I've spoken of our focus on deepening relationships, elevating the role we play in Australian Cricket, and seeking an appropriate and sustainable funding base that allows us to employ high quality people that can capitalise on the most exciting opportunity for cricket in the Territory in decades. As we enter the fourth year of our Strategic Plan, I'm proud to say we have achieved that in what has been a transformative year for our organisation.

The return of International Cricket to the Northern Territory was an extraordinary achievement. We thank Cricket Australia and the Northern Territory Government for supporting a unique opportunity to open the 2025-26 Australian Summer of Cricket right here in Darwin for what were the first Men's T20 Internationals ever played in the Top End.

The eyes of the cricketing world were on the dry season skies of Darwin as Mitchell Marsh hit the very first ball of the summer for six in front of a hysterical TIO Stadium sell-out crowd. That atmosphere and occasion will live with Territorians for a long time, and no doubt inspire the next generation of Jake Weatherald's and D'Arcy Short's to dream of representing their country.

We have worked incredibly hard to re-open the door to those national and international opportunities in what is now the second biggest sport in the world, showcasing our unique value proposition to both Australian Cricket and a Northern Territory Government looking to re-build an economy, grow a population and drive visitation.

Hosting the Australian Men's 'A' Team in a white and red-ball series against Sri Lanka 'A' in July, as well as training camps for both the Australian Women's Team and Australian Men's Team with an Intellectual Disability in May is a testament to that work, and the growing reputation Northern Territory Cricket is building as an elite cricket destination.

However, nothing highlights the progress and potential of our winter cricket business better than the quantum leap the Top End T20 Series took in 2025.

We've grown our total global audience from 4m (2022) to 10.6m (2023) to 12.8m (2024) to an incredible 53.4m in 2025, with more than half the Big Bash League and ICC Members (Pakistan, Bangladesh, Nepal) sending teams to participate in what is quickly becoming regarded as the second best T20 competition in Australia behind the BBL. This year we also welcomed our first privately owned T20 franchise from the United States, the Chicago Kingsmen, illustrating the rapidly shifting global landscape of the sport and the enormity of space we can play in.

This year's event included 42 players with International experience, 45 players with BBL experience and 68 First-Class players, dramatically elevating cricket to an elite level and driving record levels of viewership, media coverage and social media engagement. The Perth Scorchers Academy claiming the trophy in an event that saw 11 teams play 36 T20 fixtures across 5 venues and 11 days.

Over the past 12 months we've recruited outstanding people into key roles across Community Cricket, High Performance, Media & Communications, Clubs & Competitions and Grounds and Facilities, and our strategy is now firmly embedded in our organisational culture. We have a team who are clear on our purpose and the huge opportunities in front of us, and the unprecedented progress and growth we have achieved this year is a reflection of their energy, effort and ambition.

This has required significant investment in facilities, programs and people, but we've laid the foundations for future growth while at the same time delivering immediate benefits to our community, clubs and competitions.

At the time of publication, we were thrilled with the announcement that Jake Weatherald had been selected in the Ashes Test Squad for the First Test. Born and bred in Darwin, the 30-year-old Northern Territorian grew up playing cricket for Darwin Cricket Club and Tracy Village Cricket Club and progressed through the NT Cricket pathway before relocating to Adelaide in his teens to pursue his dream of playing cricket professionally.

It has been wonderful to see Jake return to Darwin over the past couple of years to play for Darwin Cricket Club in the DDCC, and the NT Strike in the Top End T20 Series. Not only has it been clear to everyone locally that Jake works exceptionally hard on his game and is very clear and driven to achieve his goals, but that he remains incredibly grounded, approachable and grateful for the opportunities and support he received growing up playing cricket here in the NT.

Jake's selection in the Ashes Test Squad sends a wonderful, powerful and aspirational message to kids of all ages who dream of big things in all sports across the Northern Territory. The entire NT Cricket community is very proud of him and right behind him, and hopefully at the time of reading he has got the nod into the final XI in Perth.

Regardless, Jake is as close as anyone from the Territory has ever been, on the cusp of joining an illustrious group. Since 1877 and over the course of 148 years, there have only been 471 men go on to play Test Cricket for Australia. It has been a hell of a 12 months for cricket in the Top End, so if ever there was a year where Jake would become the first Territorian ever to play Test Cricket and wear the Baggy Green it is 2025.

Our Community Cricket staff have done an exceptional job driving increased participation across the Territory. They've created new and inclusive playing opportunities and delivered more programs in more schools, more clubs and in more remote areas than ever before. We have seen new pilot programs such as 'Girls-only Colour Blast', 'Woolworths Cricket Blast' and 'Social Smash' delivered across the Top End and Central Australia, supported in parallel by the professionalisation of our competition administration and the prioritisation of the 'participant experience'.

It has also been wonderful to see our incredible volunteers recognised on the national stage. Chrissie Ponter (Federal Cricket Club, Alice Springs) winning Cricket Australia's 2025 National Volunteer of the Year Award, a huge honour, and Mel Nixon (Tracy Village Cricket Club, Darwin) winning Cricket Australia's 2025 Women & Girls Initiative Award. Both Chrissie and Mel becoming just the second and third Territorians to win a CA National Community Cricket Award since the awards began in 2016.

Throughout the year more than \$13 million was committed to current or future cricket infrastructure projects across the Territory. Thanks to the Federal Government, Northern Territory Government and the Australian Cricket Infrastructure Fund (ACIF), facility upgrades will take place at Tracy Village Sporting Precinct (\$3m), Palmerston Cricket Club Woodroffe Oval (\$6.45m), Darwin Cricket Club (\$2m), Nightcliff Cricket Club (\$2.0m), Jim McConville Oval (\$1.4m) and DXC Arena (\$500k), helping enable and protect the future of our sport.

We've also made some tremendous progress in our pathway programs which are thriving under the leadership of former professional player Nick Winter (Head of Cricket) and Trent Keep (Pathways & Talent Development Coach), the latter's coaching potential recognised by Cricket Australia who appointed Trent to the Australia 'A' coaching staff for two separate tours throughout the year.

It was a proud and long overdue moment when for the first time ever we entered a Northern Territory U16 Female Team in the Cricket Australia Underage National Championships. While we needed some additional playing talent from Cricket Victoria to field a side, it was an important moment for female cricket in the Territory, giving 8 girls from Darwin and Alice Springs an opportunity they deserved and our organisation a 'no turning back' moment in which to further commit to building a broader and deeper female talent pool over the coming years.

The Northern Territory Indigenous Men's Team returned to the 2025 National Indigenous Cricket Championships in Mackay after the disappointment of not entering in 2024, with 16-year-old Garawa and Waanyi teenager Harrison Johnny performing well enough to become the first Northern Territorian to be selected in the annual Cricket Australia National Indigenous Training Camp held at the Melbourne Cricket Ground (MCG).

In a year of firsts, long serving local Darwin umpires Rob Stewart and Imran Muhammad became the first Territorians ever selected onto the Cricket Australia State & Territory Umpire Panel, as they continue to work towards their goal of umpiring at List-A, First-Class and National level.

On a much sadder note, I would like to pay tribute to former NT Cricket pathway player Adi Dave who tragically passed during the reporting period. Adi was a much-loved and very popular member of our cricket community and someone who despite his young age made a significant impact and lasting impression on many. Adi remains in our thoughts, as do Pankaj and Hetal Dave and all of Adi's friends and family.

We continue to receive wonderful support from our key stakeholders. I would like to acknowledge and thank all of our sponsors, members, staff, players, coaches, match officials, clubs and volunteers who make up our wonderful cricket community. Your dedication, passion and commitment have been central to everything we've achieved this year.

Our ability to grow the game in the Northern Territory is made possible by the leadership and support of our Board of Directors, whose strategic oversight and good governance continues to help shape our progress. I would like to make special mention of Director Michael Trull who has stepped down as President of the Alice Springs Cricket Association where over the course of five years he made a simply extraordinary contribution that is difficult to both convey and measure. We are lucky that Michael will remain involved in the sport through his ongoing Vice-Presidency of NT Cricket, but I would like to congratulate and thank Michael for everything he achieved for cricket in the red centre.

I would also like to thank and acknowledge the work of former Cricket Australia CEO Nick Hockley who departed during the reporting period. Nick's values driven leadership and altruistic nature was instrumental in advancing an Australian Cricket that includes the Northern Territory, and much of our recent achievements would not have been possible without his support and advocacy.

We congratulate and welcome the appointment of Todd Greenberg as the incoming CEO of Cricket Australia and look forward to working closely with him and his staff to build on the progress we have made this year on cricket truly being a game for all Australians.

I am proud of what we have achieved in 2024-25. We have set some new benchmarks in what is possible for cricket in the Northern Territory. I'm confident we can scale new heights again in 2025-26 and I look forward to the challenges and opportunities that lie ahead.



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MEN'S T20 INTERNATIONALS V SOUTH AFRICA

International Cricket returned to Darwin for the first time in 17 years as the 2025-26 Australian Summer of Cricket officially opened in Darwin with the first Men's T20 Internationals ever played in the Top End. Australia took on South Africa on 10 and 12 August as part of the BKT Tyres T20I Series, with capacity crowds and an incredible atmosphere showcasing arguably the sporting event of the year in the Northern Territory.


Close to 18,000 fans flocked to TIO Stadium across the two fixtures, with the opening game selling out in unprecedented time and 5 days prior to the event. Territorians' love of cricket was backed up by 76% local ticket sales, while cricket's national and global pulling power was demonstrated by 14% inter-state and 10% overseas ticket purchases. Cricket fans travelled to Darwin from across Australia, particularly Victoria, and from as far away as South Africa, the United Kingdom, India, the US and Malaysia.

The T20Is were also likely to be the most watched sporting events ever held in the Northern Territory thanks to cricket's massive global audience and world class broadcast partner coverage. Across just the five markets of Australia, India, South Africa, New Zealand and the UK, Game 1 was watched by an average audience of 1.53m people and Game 2 by 1.39m, with further audience expected through the wider subcontinent and other territories.

The first match saw Australia extend their T20I match-winning streak to a record nine games as they pulled off their lowest successful defence against South Africa despite losing six wickets inside the first eight overs. Amid an explosive start that included Mitch Marsh hitting a six off the very first ball of the summer, Australia stumbled to 6 for 75 before Tim David's superbly constructed 52-ball 83 and seventh-wicket stand of 59 with Ben Dwarshuis took them to a match-winning total and 17-run victory.

In the second match fans were treated to 22-year-old Dewald Brevis scoring South Africa's highest individual T20I score, South Africa's second-fastest T20I hundred off 41 balls and becoming the youngest South African to hit a century in this format as they put on their best score against Australia to square the series 1-1. Brevis, who already holds the South African domestic record for the highest T20 score of 162, put on a mesmerising display, hitting twelve fours and eight sixes for a total of 96 runs in boundaries.

Following the success of the T20Is, Northern Territory Cricket will now work closely with Cricket Australia and the Northern Territory Government to secure further International Cricket content in the coming years, giving Australian Cricket increased scheduling options throughout the year and helping drive a number of political, economic and tourism benefits for the Northern Territory.






















WESTPAC FAN DAY

Thousands of cricket fans flocked to the iconic Darwin Waterfront to meet the entire Australian Cricket Team as part of a 'Westpac Fan Day' to celebrate International Cricket's return to Darwin and the announcement of Westpac as the new Principal Partner of Cricket Australia.

Westpac has joined with Cricket Australia in a new landmark four-year agreement that will help provide opportunities for women and girls on and off the field, support initiatives aiding local clubs, volunteers and communities, and build on projects that ensure cricket is a sport for all. Local and travelling fans were treated to the rare opportunity to get up close and personal with the entire Australian Team ahead of the two T20Is, including hearing Q&As from the players, taking photos with the series trophy, and the chance to play a bit of backyard cricket with their heroes.

The Fan Day marked one of the largest full-squad public engagements by the Australian Men's Team since the 2015 ICC Men's Cricket World Cup victory reception at Federation Square in Melbourne.

AUSTRALIA A V SRI LANKA A SERIES

The Australia 'A' versus Sri Lanka "A series in July 2025 marked the return of First-Class Cricket to Darwin for the first time in 19 years. The series featured three unofficial one-day internationals followed by two four-day matches across both DXC Arena and TIO Stadium, delivering elite cricket competition in the middle of the Australian winter.

The last time a senior Australian Men's squad played First-Class Cricket in the Northern Territory was in 2006 when an Australia 'A' side captained by Brad Haddin and featuring senior stars Shane Watson and Mitchell Johnson played against a Pakistan side led by eventual Test Captain Misbah-ul-Han

This time round Australian Test players Nathan McSweeney, Matthew Renshaw and Kurtis Patterson headlined an Australia 'A' squad that also featured emerging players such as Josh Philippe, Mitch Perry and exciting 18-year-old Victorian prospect Ollie Peake.

The most pleasing selection however was undoubtedly Darwin local Jake Weatherald who was rewarded for his mountain of Sheffield Shield runs with a maiden Australia 'A' call-up. Weatherald scored an impressive 183 in the second four-day fixture at DXC Arena to further press his claims to become the first Territorian to ever play Test Cricket.

Another exciting element of the series was NT Cricket Pathways & Talent Development Coach Trent Keep being appointed by Cricket Australia to the Australia 'A' coaching staff alongside Tim Paine and Adam Griffith. This highly valuable professional development opportunity was not only great reward and recognition for Trent, but something that benefits our organisation and our talented male and female Academy players.

Australia 'A' won the 50 over fixtures 2-1 while both four-day matches ended in draws.

Northern Territory Cricket received outstanding feedback from Cricket Australia on the successful staging of the series, in particular on the performance of the drop-in wicket at TIO Stadium which will be central to ongoing discussions between CA, NT Cricket and the Northern Territory Government about the possibility of hosting a Test Match in the venue in future years.



BROADCAST, BRAND AND MEDIA

The 2025 Top End T20 Series achieved record-breaking global reach, attracting a combined audience of more than 53.4 million viewers across television and digital platforms.

Television was the strongest driver, with A Sports reaching 35.3 million viewers in Pakistan and T Sports attracting 10.2 million in Bangladesh. Together, the two networks provided free-to-air coverage to a potential audience of more than 260 million households.

Digital platforms including 7plus in Australia, FanCode in India, Willow in North America, KTV Max in Nepal, and the Cricket Australia YouTube channel further expanded the Series' global footprint, adding 8.8 million unique viewers worldwide.

Clear airtime and non-competing content ahead of the 2025 Asia Cup also enhanced exposure and viewership across South Asia. Fans consumed more than 5.8 million live viewing hours, representing a 357 per cent increase compared to 2024. The most-watched match of the tournament was Pakistan Shaheens v Nepal, which averaged 7.45 million viewers over its 3.5-hour broadcast.



MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD OF CRICKET

The past year has seen Northern Territory Cricket continue to focus heavily on community cricket, and I am pleased to report on growth across female participation, increased engagement with our diverse multicultural and Indigenous communities, and recognition for two outstanding volunteers at a national level.

The community cricket team has continued to expand, giving us much-needed capacity and capability within one of our most critical strategic areas. We welcomed Megan Harris and Hannah Armstrong into newly created 'Women and Girls Growth Lead' roles, while Jack Doyle (Darwin) and Kesh Keerthi (Alice Springs) both continued to achieve commendable results as broader 'Participation and Growth Leads'. Excitingly, we look forward to appointing two new First Nations community cricket roles in 2026 thanks to Northern Territory Government funding which will allow us to invest further in driving increased Indigenous cricket participation, engagement and representation.

The focus on attracting more 5–12-year-olds playing cricket remained at the core of our programs, with Cricket Australia data showing a strong correlation with entry-level programs and participants building a long-term affiliation with cricket.

We expanded our Woolworths Cricket Blast offerings leading to a rise in first-time participants - while school-based, holiday, and remote programs ensured cricket was accessible to all girls and boys right across the Territory; the latter including repeat visits to Borroloola, Katherine, Belyuen and Beswick on top of existing remote carnivals and Sporting School Programs.

We remained focused on overcoming risks to junior participation such as time and cost barriers, leading to the implementation of 'Smash Series' as an alternate social format (60 minutes, modified rules, no equipment) to traditional cricket. Acknowledging the additional heat factors within the Territory, NT Cricket has enjoyed early success with 'Smash' programs – with Darwin rolling out its first-ever junior 'Social Smash' in May and a Women's-only 'Mid-Week Smash' in October, while Alice Springs has seen several Smash programs increase engagement with young Indigenous cricketers who are new to the game.

The community team will continue to upskill and work alongside local volunteers and coaches given their role in shaping participant and club experience.

On this front I would like to highlight and acknowledge Chrissie Ponter (Volunteer of the Year) and Mel Nixon (Women and Girls Initiative) as winners of the Cricket Australia's National Community Cricket Awards, both of whom have led the way with their hard work and dedication over many years.

PLAY OUR WAY PROGRAM

Northern Territory Cricket was incredibly proud to be one of only two sports in the Northern Territory to be successful in their application for 'Play Our Way Program' funding to direct towards driving increased female participation, engagement and representation. The \$200m Federal Government initiative took effect in late 2024 aimed at removing barriers to women and girls playing sport, reducing discrimination and promoting equality.

Megan Harris and Hannah Armstrong (Women and Girls Growth Leads) joined our organisation during the reporting period and immediately got to work on delivering strategies and programs aimed at making cricket fun, welcoming and accessible to our female communities.

The outcome was a genuine watershed year for our sport in the Northern Territory. We set female participation records in structured competitions, social and entry level programs; we saw the emergence of talented and aspiring young players in our female Academy; we showcased and highlighted the incredible female volunteer base driving our community game; and we provided genuine, safe and inclusive opportunities for women and girls at all levels to step forward and play an increased role in the sport.

We are really pleased with the foundations we have laid in year one of the three-year funding agreement and we are excited and confident about the progress that can be made in 2025-26.

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MULTICULTURAL CUP

The 2025 Multicultural Cup, proudly sponsored by City of Darwin and the Northern Territory Government, was the second successive year Northern Territory Cricket ran the event that was previously known as the 'Asia Cup.'

The Multicultural Cup aims to promote inclusivity and drive greater connection amongst the various diverse communities of Darwin with a focus on bringing local people together to celebrate a shared passion for cricket, culture and community.

Research continues to show that Southeast Asian cricket loving communities are driving the Northern Territory's population growth, and Cricket Australia's Multicultural Action Plan identifies the Northern Territory as having the highest percentage (61%) of people in the country with one or more parents born overseas.

The 2025 tournament continued to grow in scale and inclusivity, featuring 12 teams representing 8 cultures, including new entrants England, Nepal, and First Nations Australia. All 33 matches were played at DXC Arena, bringing together 210 players and 18 Match Officials born in 8 different countries and representing families from 13 nations, including India, Nepal, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, Argentina, Kuwait, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea and the United Kingdom.

The Grand Final saw Sri Lanka face the India Dingoes, with the India Dingoes claiming victory by 17 runs.










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REMOTE INDIGENOUS CRICKET CARNIVALS

Indigenous Cricket has a proud and rich history in the Northern Territory, celebrated through regional and remote carnivals including the Dingo Cup (Timber Creek), Barra Cup (Borroloola), Nitmiluk Cup (Katherine) and the Rossy Williams Shield (Tennant Creek).

The carnivals were founded by NT Cricket Life Member Marcus Rosas back in 2003 as a vehicle to promote increased Indigenous cricket participation. They are strategically structured to begin in the Top End before gradually making their way down the Territory alongside shifting weather patterns and culminating in Australia's largest Indigenous Cricket Carnival, the Imparja Cup in Alice Springs.

Dingo Cup: The Dingo Cup was held in Timber Creek through some seriously hot conditions in October. Despite the humidity, some fantastic cricket was played between the two competing sides, Timber Creek Bush Turkeys and the Kalano Crocs.

Barra Cup: The Barra Cup was another outstanding success, featuring five teams, including a primary and secondary school side from Borroloola School. The event concluded at the Kingash Bay Fishing Club, where the inaugural 'Shaun Cairns Memorial Trophy' was presented to Jamie Seib in recognition of his exceptional efforts to unite the community through cricket.

Nitmiluk Cup: Due to a significant increase in participation, the Nitmiluk Cup was expanded to two venues for the first time. Despite the hot and humid conditions, the carnival was a tremendous success with a record 12 teams, including travelling sides from Darwin, Timber Creek and Venndale.

Rossy Williams Shield: This year saw a record 10 teams participating at the Rossy Williams Shield, with all 70 participants residing in town. The highlight of the weekend was local Tennant Creek Primary School students, who had been engaged earlier in the week during school programs, playing social cricket games around the outside of the oval during the Rossy Williams Shield.

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32ND ANNUAL IMPARJA CUP

The 32nd Annual Imparja Cup powered by DXC Technology took place from February 15 to 19 2025 in Mparntwe (Alice Springs), continuing the event's legacy as Australia's oldest and largest Indigenous cricket carnival. This year's event drew over 300 players, coaches and match officials from across the Territory and Australia to compete across five days and four divisions including Major Centres, Men's Community, Women's Community and a Schools Division.

The story of this year's tournament was the Redfern All Blacks (Sydney's only Indigenous cricket club established in 2004) travelling 3,000 km to participate in the Major Centres Division as part of their 20-year anniversary celebrations. Other highlights included the Schools Division doubling from 4 teams to 8 including 2 female teams; the Schools Gala Day growing to five schools and 104 students; and the first-ever 'Girls-only Colour Blast' cricket clinic to be delivered on Arrernte Country.

One of the more significant moments took place away from the field, with the event providing a fitting platform in which to present Shane Franey and Ross Williams with their NT Cricket Life Membership Award as the founders and driving force behind the Imparja Cup.

Former NT Cricket Chair, fellow Life Member and long-time Alice Springs resident Dr Bruce Walker AM was on hand to appropriately acknowledge and celebrate Shane and Rossy's remarkable contribution to the game. Over three decades, their passion and generosity shaped the Imparja Cup into a national fixture, fostering participation and pathways for Indigenous cricketers at all levels. Their efforts laying the foundation for the National Indigenous Cricket Championships and positioning NT Cricket as a leader in Indigenous cricket nationwide.

NT Cricket would again like to thank the many wonderful sponsors and partners who continue to keep the Imparja Cup story alive. The support of Imparja TV, DXC Technology, Alice Springs Town Council, Yeperenye, Kookaburra and No More remains central to the events viability and ensuring hat future generations of Indigenous boys and girls get the apportunity to play in it for years to come.

CRICKET AUSTRALIA NATIONAL COMMUNITY CRICKET AWARDS

The National Community Cricket Awards are the highest recognition across Australia for individuals, clubs, and associations that have shown excellence in their roles and made a positive impact in the communities they serve.

Since their inception in 2016, the NT has only had one previous 'Winner' with Marcus Rosas awarded the 'Official of the Year' in 2021, and one previous 'Highly Commended' with John Tate coming runner up in the 'Volunteer of the Year' award in 2024

However, in 2024-25 Chrissie Ponter (Federal Cricket Club, Alice Springs) and Mel Nixon (Tracy Village Cricket Club, Darwin) became the second and third Territorians to win these major community cricket awards and receive national recognition for their outstanding efforts.

Chrissie Ponter (Federal Cricket Club, Alice Springs) won the highly prestigious 'Volunteer of the Year' award for her significant contribution to women's cricket in the red centre. Chrissie has been responsible for organising competitions, scoring matches, co-ordinating trainings, securing vital funding for improved female facilities and female pathway programs, fulfilling team manager duties, and driving Indigenous female participation at the Imparja Cup.



Melissa Nixon (Tracy Village Cricket Club, Darwin) won the 'Women & Girls Initiative' award, with her influence as a junior coordinator for the past five years (and now as the first female President of the club) resulting in high participation growth across Tracy Village's female programs. Mel's impact recognised through Tracy Village having the highest girls cricket blast participants, leading the way in providing female-inclusive environments (including subsidising costs), and the club winning the 2025 DDCC Club Championship for most competition points across male and female teams.

AANT VOLUNTEER RECOGNITION PROGRAM





DARWIN & DISTRICTS CRICKET COMPETITION



The 2025 Darwin and Districts Cricket Season has been a year of growth, innovation, investment and recognition.

This year marked a significant step forward on so many fronts, demonstrating as much as anything what is possible when the entire DDCC community works together and in everyone's best interests.

We launched the season on April 5 with a T20 Triple Header at DXC Arena, our earliest ever start, with close to 500 people attending this new concept that brought our cricket community together and set the tone for an exciting cricket season. For the first time we delivered a full Men's T20 competition, introduced a second Women's Division, launched an inter-state female player program, and added three new Sunday cricket offerings aimed at better catering for why people are playing the game.

These initiatives reflect our strategic purpose to unite and inspire our community through cricket, and our vision of cricket as a thriving sport for all. We had 1,447 unique participants (+10%) and hosted over 850 matches across all divisions of Men's, Women's and Junior cricket. Female registrations grew 14% as we continue to prioritise the growth of our female participation base.

Junior cricket continues to build momentum as a vital pathway for the future of the game. Thanks to the combined efforts of our Community Cricket Team and club-led Cricket Blast programs, participation at the junior level grew significantly this season. We recorded a 3% increase in junior registrations, with more teams competing in the Under 12 Red and Under 15 Red competitions than ever before. This growth reflects the success of our entry-level programs in transitioning young players into formal competition and strengthening the pipeline into senior cricket.

Looking ahead, junior cricket remains central to our strategy to ensure cricket is a sport of choice for the next generation. Continued investment in programs, coaching, and club support will be critical to sustaining this upward trend and fostering a lifelong love of the game among boys and girls across the Territory.

Our coordinated 'themed' rounds made a strong impact, with increased alignment across clubs this year. The Beyond Blue Mental Health Matches contributed considerable awareness and support for a cause close to our community, while Pink Stumps activities raised close to \$6,000 for the McGrath Foundation, with a significant portion due to the efforts of the Tracy Village Cricket Club.

NT Cricket would like to thank our wonderful sponsors who support the Darwin and Districts Cricket Competition - particularly our longstanding partners Carlton & United Breweries, DXC Technology, Casuarina All Sports Club, McDonalds and Kookaburra – as well as our incredible community of clubs, players, match officials and volunteers who have been central to everything that has been accomplished this year.

We are really proud of what the DDCC has been able to showcase this season and we are confident that together we have laid some excellent foundations for future growth in 2026. However, there is a strong body of evidence developing both nationally and globally that indicates we will need to continue to change, evolve and be courageous in our decision making if we are to remain a sport of choice for future generations of boys and girls.

The 2024/25 season continued the strong progress of cricket in Alice Springs. Since forming in 1976, the Association has maintained steady growth, and I am pleased to present this report at the conclusion of my fifth and final term as President.

Representative Cricket – Alice Springs competed in the SACA Country Championships in Adelaide, narrowly missing the grand final. Banjo Waring was selected in the Team of the Tournament following a consistent performance.

Season Overview – A wet summer created scheduling challenges, including interruptions during finals weekend. Thanks to the efforts of NT Cricket staff, curators and volunteers, most matches proceeded as planned. Turf wickets were used extensively, with several B Grade matches played on turf.

The C Grade competition was paused for the season, and B Grade was expanded to include up to nine teams. Cricket did not feature in the scaled-back Masters Games program.

Junior Cricket – Junior competitions continued to develop, supported by clubs and development officers. The season featured Under 16, Under 13 and Under 10 age groups, including Under 16 matches under lights. The Woolworths Cricket Blast program, supported by NT Cricket, attracted more than 50 participants.

Umpiring – Thank you to umpires Philip Nippress, David Young and Paul Rumpff, and to the club volunteers who assisted with officiating throughout the season.

Thank you to the ASCA executive team of Kim Dick, Mick Gill, Vicki Hutchinson and Richard Bond for their commitment across the year. Special acknowledgment to Neville Hill, who steps down after more than a decade of service, for his work in ground preparation, fixturing and operations.

The return of First-Class and International Cricket to the Territory in 2025, as well as the flourishing Top End T20 Series, brought with it excellent development and representative opportunities for our most talented and committed umpires and scorers, the outcome of which were a number of milestones and achievements that several years ago would have been considered beyond reach.

Rob Stewart and Imran Muhammad were rewarded with selection by Cricket Australia onto the State & Territory Umpire Panel (STUP) for Season 2025-26, their inclusion marking the first time that members of the NTCMOA have been recognised at this level.

After standing at the Cricket Australia Under 19 National Championships at the end of 2024, Rob Stewart was selected to undertake the Cricket Australia Level 3 High Performance Umpiring course specifically designed to prepare umpires for the demands of First-Class and List A domestic cricket, representing a significant progression towards officiating at the national level.

Rob Stewart will stand in several W/BBL fixtures throughout the 2025-26 Australian domestic season, a wonderful achievement and a testament to Rob's continued dedication, hard work and ambition to progress to the highest levels of the game.

Congratulations must also be extended to long-standing NTCMOA members Mark White, Kathryn White and Chery Owens, who were appointed scorers for the T20 Internationals between Australia and South Africa, a wonderful experience while Mark, Kathryn and Zita Varatharajan debuted at First Class level, scoring throughout the Australia 'A' and Sr Lanka 'A' series.

At a more local level our umpires and scorers continue to play a critical role as part of a volunteer community that remains the lifeblood of our sport. Northern Territory Cricket and the NTCMOA would like to acknowledge the extraordinary job umpires and scorers across the Territory have done this season. The dedication, sacrifice and selflessness on display at cricket grounds every weekend is commendable and beyond appreciated.

MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD OF CRICKET

With over a year of experience now at NT Cricket, I feel I have learnt a lot about the Territory and the opportunities that present for growth across our pathway system.

At a high level, cricket in the Territory has never been in a more exciting place – with the return of international men's cricket, five BBL Franchises and four International Teams competing as part of the Top End Series, and four separate Australian representative teams touring Darwin across the dry season. My hope is that these touchpoints inspire the next generation of Territory boys and girls to one-day also be in the 'green and gold'.

While NT Cricket will always face challenges across resources, the introduction of Trent Keep as the Pathway and Talent Development Coach has been my highlight for the year – with Trent showing an unwavering connection to our pathway boys and girls, and consequently I have seen player performances and confidence improve as a result.

A key decision this year was to implement a renewed Academy, with NT Cricket committing more resources into the Territory's top players with the aim of developing professional players and bridging the gap to wider Cricket Australia high-performance systems. 

NT STRIKE

For the first time, NT were able to welcome back all four current home-grown professional cricketers in Kane Richardson, D'Arcy Short, Jake Weatherald and Tom Andrews, with the quartet headlining an NT Strike team that also featured former Australian U19 fast bowler Tom Menzies and 2025 Ralph Wiese Medallist Jacob Dickman.

It cannot be overstated how significant and beneficial it was to be in a position, thanks to the rising standard and quality of the Top End T20 Series, to bring back Richardson, Short, Weatherald and Andrews to play for their home State.

The four best players to ever progress through the NT Pathway and on to become elite professional cricketers added star power and profile, and played an invaluable role in coaching, teaching and mentoring our next generation of talent who relished the opportunity to play with and learn from these guys.

Led by former New Zealand Blackcaps Bowling Coach and current Wellington Firebirds Head Coach Shane Jurgensen. The Strike were victorious in their opening match against Nepal in front of more than 1,000 spectators at DXC Arena, before following up with two more wins against Hobart Hurricanes in the 'Country Clash' at Gerry Wood Oval and ACT Comets. The Strike's remaining matches saw narrow defeats to Bangladesh, Chicago Kingsmen and the eventual champions, Perth Scorchers, with the Territory narrow missing out on finals with a 3-3 record.

Tom Menzies was the standout performer for the Strike, finishing with 12 wickets (5th leading wicket taker), while Connor Carroll led the way with 160 runs and Cadell McMahon finished with nine dismissals (2nd highest).

The Top End Series also saw local talent Archie McCormick (19 yrs) and Sam Barker (17 yrs) make their senior NT Strike debut after impressing in local DDCC cricket and the Academy, giving the local community a glimpse into the future alongside wicketkeeper Cadell McMahon (17yrs) who played in all fixtures.

NATIONAL INDIGENOUS CRICKET CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Northern Territory returned to the National Indigenous Cricket Championships (NICC) in April 2025, marking an important step forward for Indigenous cricket and pathways within the Territory after the disappointment of not being in a position to field a team in 2024.

The NICC was held in Yuwibara Country (Mackay, Queensland) for the first time having evolved out of the Imparja Cup in 2016 and only ever previously been held in Alice Springs.

The NT Indigenous Male team was led by Captain Lachlan Dunemann (Kalkadoon/ Tennant Creek), while six players were selected from performances at the 2025 Imparja Cup, including 15-year-old Harrisor Johnny (Garawa Waanyi/Alice Springs), with an increased emphasis on positioning Imparja as a selection vehicle and pathway

The NICC was unfortunately heavily rain affected, with all matches reduced to a T10 format and several abandoned. NT were winless across their five matches, with the closest a narrow defeat to South Australia by three runs. NT were awarded the Spirit of Cricket, while Bradley Illot (Arrernte) was named in the Team of the Tournament.

Following the conclusion of the NICC,
Harrison Johnny was named in the Cricket
Australia and Melbourne Cricket Club's
annual National Indigenous Training Camp,
which provides cultural, cricket and personal
development opportunities for the best
Indigenous male and female talent under
23 from across the country, culminating in
a marquee match against the Melbourne
Cricket Club on the MCG in October.

The past twelve months has been an extraordinary year for the Grounds and Facilities Team with some major milestones and achievements.

The 2024-25 season was the most ambitious cricket schedule in the Northern Territory in over two decades, if not ever, highlighted by opening the Australian Summer of Cricket in Darwin with the first Men's T20 Internationals ever played here and a Top End T20 Series that has grown from 11 to 36 fixtures in the space of four years to become a global event watched by 54m viewers.

First-Class Cricket returned to Darwin for the first time since 2006 with a 3 week white and red ball series between Australia 'A' and Sri Lanka 'A' and we hosted training camps for both the Australian Women's Team and Australian Men's Team with an Intellectual Disability, further showcasing our capability to deliver elite level cricket as well as our world-class cricket facilities.

At the community level we supported unprecedented growth in participation and programs. From multiple venues across the Darwin and Districts Cricket Competition and Alice Springs Cricket Association Competition, to events such as Kookaburra Junior Strike League and Interstate Challenge, the Imparja Cup, the Multicultural Cup and many others. We delivered or supported facilities for over 1,500 cricket matches across Darwin and Alice Springs in the only State or Territory in Australia that plays cricket all year round.



Through the hard work of our talented team, continued investment from the Northern Territory Government and Australian Cricket Infrastructure Fund (ACIF), as well as a strong partnership approach with local councils, sporting codes, clubs, and contractors, we have been able to deliver high-quality pitches and facilities from grassroots to international level.

I'm proud of the commitment, adaptability, and professionalism our team has shown in meeting the demands of a record workload. We remain driven to provide the best possible facilities for our community, ensuring the Territory continues to grow as a respected destination for cricket.



CURATING TEAM

Northern Territory Cricket has a rich history of outstanding curators, the likes of Isaac McDonald, Brad Baptist and Matthew Sandery, and that has continued this year with the performance of our current Grounds and Facilities Team who have continued to set new standards for hard work, quality and commitment.

Senior Curator Angus Vear, along with apprentices Bevan Maher and Blake Gilbert, have been exceptional. Dylan Fry made a valuable contribution during a short-term secondment from the South Australian Cricket Association (SACA), while Justin Galeotti, who joined the team for six months through our peak period was simply outstanding.

The appointment of Tim Shaw as Project Officer – Facilities and Infrastructure has strengthened the team's capacity to deliver projects across the Territory. NT Cricket acknowledges the important contribution of local curators, councils and contractors in maintaining high-quality facilities. Special thanks to Steven Bailey, Craig Johnston, Anthony Scott, Adam Melbourne, Danny Griffiths, John Tate, Kym Lawrence, Alex Bleakley, Ben Ellis and Paul Rumpff for their ongoing support and dedication.

Across the Territory, our staff and contractors worked hard to deliver a demanding schedule, and their attention to detail ensured that every wicket and outfield met the expectations of both local players and International athletes. The ongoing development of local curating talent within our grounds team remains a key focus, ensuring we build long-term capability for NT Cricket's future.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the year ended 30 June 2025

1) BASIS OF PREPARATION

The financial statements cover Northern Territory Cricket Limited as an individual entity. Northern Territory Cricket Limited is a not-for-profit Company incorporated in the Northern Territory under the Corporations Act 2001.

The directors have prepared the financial statements on the basis that the not-for-profit Company is a non-reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. These financial statements are therefore a special purpose financial statements that has been prepared in order to meet the requirements of the Corporations Act 2001. The Company is a not-for-profit company for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the Corporations Act 2001 and the material accounting policy information disclosed below, which the directors have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with those of previous periods unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

Material accounting policy information is consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

2) MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICY INFORMATION

a) Revenue and other income

Grants and sponsorships

When the entity receives operating grant revenue or sponsorships, it assesses whether the contract is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance with AASB 15.

When both these conditions are satisfied, the Company:

- identifies each performance obligation relating to the grant
- recognises a contract liability for its obligations under the agreement
- recognises revenue as it satisfies its performance obligations.

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the entity and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Sale of goods

Revenue is recognised on transfer of goods to the customer as this is deemed to be the point in time when risks and rewards are transferred and there is no longer any ownership or effective control over the goods.

Dividend income

The Company receives monthly dividend payments from the Casuarina Club, these are recorded on an accrual basis when the Company is entitled to them.

Grant revenue

Government grants are recognised at fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all grant conditions will be met. Grants relating to expense items are recognised as income over the periods necessary to match the grant to the costs they are compensating. Grants relating to assets are credited to deferred income at fair value and are credited to income over the expected useful life of the asset on a straight-line basis.

Other income

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when the Company is entitled to it.

2) MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICY INFORMATION (CONTINUED)

b) Income tax

The Company is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

c) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

d) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and deposits held at call with banks.

e) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are carried at cost, independent or directors' valuation. All assets excluding freehold land and buildings, are depreciated over their useful lives to the Company.

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the assets useful life to the Company, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

2) MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICY INFORMATION (CONTINUED)

f) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the Company's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees. Employee benefits expected to be settled within one year together with benefits arising from wages, salaries and annual leave which may be settled after one year, have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled plus related on costs.

The Company recognises a liability for long service leave when the employee has reached 5 years of service. The Board of Directors have determined that not discounting these future cash flows would not have a material impact on these financial statements. They are recorded at the amounts expected to be paid when settled.

Contributions are made by the Company to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

g) Financed vehicles

Financing of fixed assets where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not the legal ownership that are transferred to the Company are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for that period.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives where it is likely that the Company will obtain ownership of the asset or over the term of the lease.
